GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE TEAM TO CENTRAL AMERICA

The Rotary Clubs of Nelson are seeing outstanding young professionals to form part of a Group Study Exchange Team to the Central American countries of Honduras, Belize and Guatemala. Preference will be given to candidates who are fluent in Spanish. The team will consist of a Rotarian leader and four non-Rotarian team members.

The team will travel to Rotary District 4250, study the host country's institutions and ways of life, observe their own vocations as practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas. The purpose of the Group Study Exchange program is to promote international understanding and goodwill through person-to-person contact. While abroad, team members stay in the homes of Rotarians and have the opportunity to meet their professional counterparts. They will also give presentations to Rotary clubs and other groups while abroad and share their experiences with local clubs upon their return. Team participation offers the most unique and rewarding skills-building opportunity and personal growth experience available to young professionals.

The Rotary Foundation provides round trip air tickets. Team members pay for personal and incidental expenses. Team members must be prepared to participate in orientation sessions prior to the exchange, remain with the group throughout the exchange and maintain good standards of behavior. The exchange will take place from January 22 – February 24, 2009.

People interested in applying should be 25 to 40 years of age and employed full time in a recognized business or profession for at least 2 years and be committed to remaining in the work force after the exchange. Applications for Team Members (form 161 EN) are available for download on the Rotary District 5080 website or through this link: http://www.rotary.org/Rldocuments/en_pdf/161en.pdf Applicants must live or be employed within Rotary District 5080. Deadline for submission of applications to the Rotary Clubs of Nelson is 8 a.m. on Tuesday May 13. Preliminary interviews will take place during the following week. Short listed applications will be endorsed by the local Rotary clubs. District interviews will take place in Trail, BC on May 28.

CLUB DONATIONS OF 2 SHELTERBOXES WILL HELP VICTIMS IN MYANMAR

When President Pat Dooley put out a call for club members to take advantage of a club matching offer whereby private donations will be met by a matching club grant in order that the club might sponsor 2 Shelter Boxes, little did she know that within weeks, the world would be hearing of the massive disaster in Myanmar caused by a typhoon.

SHELTERBOX responded immediately with help and will send photojournalist Mark Pearson to cover the distribution of the aid, he will be sending back photos as journalist access is restricted. ShelterBox made an immediate response by sending 224 boxes from Shelterbox's pre-positioned site in Dubai, 220 boxes were sent from Australia, and 400 were packed in the UK HQ, in Helston, England. More vital first response aid will follow depending on the level of donations. Leilei N.Thein the daughter-in-law of General Aung-San contacted ShelterBox to offer support and a clear passage into Myanmar.

Nelson Daybreak's 15th anniversary shared the spotlight in an evening that celebrated socially responsible youth in our community who are committed to "service above self". What a tremendous job the Executive did to further the goal of enhancing youth awareness in Rotary. When the 12 students from L.V. Rogers Secondary and Mt. Sentinel Elementary Secondary were asked what they knew about Rotary, their immediate response was "youth exchange", "projects in the community" and "scholarships". Good thing that they knew about Rotary Youth Exchange because the club was joined by our own Youth Exchange Student from Brazil, Hugo Braga and the Rotary Club of Nelson's student Rafael from Germany.

Our club shared some of our current projects such as the literacy project in Guatemala that provides 4 teachers, the ONIL stove project in Guatemala that provides fuel efficient stoves and contributes to a lessening of children being burned by open fires and problems with respiratory diseases. So too, our contribution to Shelterbox which involves the transportation and provision of shelter, clean water, cooking equipment, tools for reconstruction and a children's activity pack, all contained in a durable plastic box. Advance storage facilities have now been established in Dubai to provide better response time for the delivery of boxes to the Far East. The club also talked about our dream of making the entrance to Nelson more attractive through clean-up and new landscaping.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation about the ambitious international service activities undertaken by students of both schools present. Mount Sentinel students presented a slide show about work that they had undertaken in Tijuana Mexico during spring break. Housed in an orphanage, the students rapidly came to appreciate the tough life that children have to face when their parents are either deceased or do not have the means to support them. A ready camaraderie developed between the students and the "orphans" through games and quiet one on one time. The students completed the construction of a home for a single mother and her young family. They planted an orchard for the orphanage that included trees such as avocado and apples. They ventured into the local dump with supplies of staple foods and were immediately swarmed by dump children. Lasting impressions have left these vibrant young students wanting to take on more projects in this same area.

LV Rogers students, known as the Celebrate Africa Group is a branch of the Free the Children organization, the largest network of youth helping youth. The students proudly showed slides of the school that they had funded in Yamandu Village, Kono District in the Eastern region of Sierra Leone. In the past 3 years, the students have raised over \$16,000.00 to fund the school, a well, a teacher and school supplies. The students currently involved with this project are optimistic that future students at LV Rogers will continue with this Celebration. Watch for fund-raisers such as the giant musical event, Keep the Beat scheduled for Rotary Lakeside Park in July.

In the forthcoming months the Rotary Clubs of Nelson and the students will be in consultation about the opportunities to form an Interact Club and the assessment of interest in the local secondary school population.
